The data we provide is used by the National Weather Service, scientists across NOAA and throughout the U.S., the commercial sector, and private citizens for a wide range of applications, including:

Weather Forecasting

95% of the data used in weather forecasting models comes from satellites. NESDIS operates the Nation's weather satellites around the clock, 365 days a year. We also maintain international datasharing agreements that provide the U.S. with access to global data. Weather reports that help you plan your day or help FEMA prepare before a hurricane all start with NESDIS information.

Environmental Monitoring

We monitor a number of environmental conditions daily, weekly, seasonally, and over years to understand conditions on our planet and changes to our climate. We provide authoritative assessments of the U.S. and global climate. We also maintain one of the most significant archives of environmental data on Earth. From millionyear-old tree rings to near-real-time satellite images, we provide access to comprehensive atmospheric, coastal, oceanic, and geophysical data.
